

2007 HIGHLIGHTS AND STATISTICS



In 2007 the Health Department continued to spread the message that "Washing your hands is the single most effective way to prevent the spread of disease," with the distribution of anti-bacterial hand-wipes and accessibility to hand sanitizer at fairs, festivals and other public events.

◆ The Environmental Health Division began enforcement of the Smoke- Free **Workplace Act in May. The division** received 146 complaints which lead to 87 investigations. There were 16 businesses that received a warning letter; seven were fined at least once; four were fined at least twice; and one business was fined three times.

The position of dental hygienist was added to the dental clinic in 2007 and helped account for an increase in the number of patients seen. The clinic also benefited from the addition of a panoramic X-ray machine donated by Dr. David Pressler, a local dentist.

♦ Monthly Senior Wellness Clinics continued in 2007 with 214 seniors participating in free screenings.

♦ The Health Department continued to be the main provider of childhood immunizations in the county. In 2007 the **Health Department began offering** Gardisil, a new vaccine for girls which prevents four strains of Human Papil-Ioma Virus (HPV); and Zostavax to senior citizens which prevents shingles. Also in 2007, Menactra, a Meningitis vaccine, was offered free through the **Ohio Department of Health and is now** available at no charge to children of all income levels. All childhood vaccines continue to be free, with a \$10 administration charge per visit.

◆ There was heightened awareness of MRSA in 2007 with several reported cases of "community acquired" or **CA-MRSA.** Nursing Director Jackie Fletcher, RN, coordinated a public forum with other local health officials to address concerns about this communicable disease and made presentations to local school staffs and other groups.

◆ 2007 saw the development of the **Public Health Partnership of Knox** County, a 501(c)(3) foundation whose primary activity will be to obtain grants particularly to fund high-priority projects and services for the Knox County **General Health District.**

◆ Presentations or events provided by the Health Department included: child CPR classes; tax clinics; smoking cessation classes; Women's Health Month program; person-in-charge training for food service operations: communicable disease classes for child care centers; the MammoVan; blood borne pathogen classes; Safety Town; distribution of child car seats; teacher in-service on abstinence curriculum: PLANET and MOBI trainings.



In November, Knox County voters overwhelmingly approved a replacement tax levy for the health district by a margin of 66 to 34 percent. The five-year, 0.4 mill levy will generate funds through 2013.

◆ The Board of Health issued orders for the clean-up of three solid waste nuisances; declared two properties unfit for human habitation; revoked the registration for one sewage installer and issued a six-month suspension for
