with others. From inspections and consultations to education programs and direct care; from collaboration to specific programs and services, I am proud to say that public health is making a difference in the lives of Knox County residents.

In 2015, we collaborated with more than 20 other agencies to publish the Community Health Assessment (CHA) and began work on the Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP) tackling the problems of substance abuse, obesity and mental health.

Our outreach efforts included clinic services and tobacco cessations classes at The Winter Sanctuary and we took our monthly STD clinic to the campus of Kenyon College. We helped present Knox County Safety Day, and participated in Family Fun Day at Ariel Foundation Park.

We celebrated being the first local agency to offer home health services beginning in 1965 — one year ahead of inclusion with Medicare. We sponsored the Get Healthy Monday campaign, provided food service education with Person in Charge and Serv Safe classes and offered blood borne pathogen training for community groups.

Our entire staff began the process of national accreditation and the community health clinic staff tackled the learning curve of using electronic medical records.

One of our biggest accomplishments was the creation of the Knox County Community Health Center Board which is working towards applying for funding for a Federally Qualified Health Center (FQHC) — something we look forward to telling you about in next year's annual report.



#### **Financial Overview**


REVENUE\* - \$3,544,113

### Highlights from 2015



To promote breastfeeding, the WIC division placed life-like cutouts of breastfeeding moms at various businesses including this one at Kmart. Window clings were also sent to businesses to post to show their acceptance of breastfeeding at their location.



After collecting the data in 2014, it was analyzed and published as the Community Health Assessment in 2015 for use by local agencies. The top community health issues were alcohol and drug abuse, obesity, mental health, lack of health insurance and diabetes.
